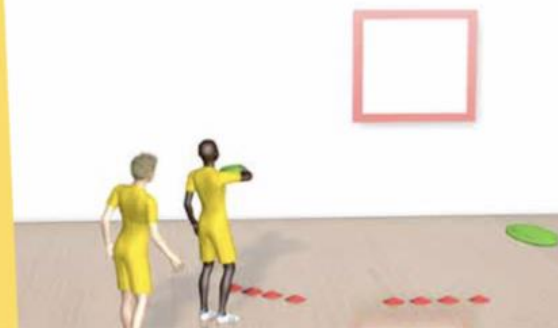
ULTIMATE FRISBEE TARGET DISC

Quick introduction

Players attempt to throw a disc through a target zone from a variety of angles and distances.

Getting started

- Mark a square on the wall 1.5m x 1.5m (or use a suitably sized frame) roughly 1m off the floor.
- Place throwing lines/markers on the floor in the layout shown below.
- Each player takes it in turns to shoot at the target from each of the throwing markers.
- It can be set such that each player takes multiple throws from each mark.
- Every time the disc hits the target, the player scores a point. The highest scorer after all throws are made is the winner.

How to play

1. Create a target for you to aim at
2. Choose an object for you to play with
3. Choose how your object is going to travel towards the target

Equipment

Essential

- A target
- An object (e.g. ball, frisbee or any other item)

Optional

- Items to use as obstacles

Spirit of The Games



Determination:

Do you give up when you don't hit the target, or do you keep trying?



Honesty:

Are you always honest about if the object hits the target or not?

Safety

- Make sure that the area you are playing in is clear of people.
- Make sure the items you are using are not heavy, breakable or dangerous.
- Are there any areas/objects that could get broken in the space?

Skill up

- Do different items require different types of throws?

Link it up

- This game helps you get better at games e.g. Archery, bowls and boccia. It also helps you score a goal, or hit a target in other games e.g. Football, Tennis, Basketball and Netball

Did you know:

The term “frisbee” is used to describe **all** flying discs, and is a registered trademark of the Wham-O toy company. Therefore, the term cannot be used by anyone else, and the sport is known simply as **“Ultimate”** as opposed to “Ultimate Frisbee”.

The first intercollegiate Ultimate game was played on the 6th November **1972**, between Princeton University and Rutgers University. It was played in a car park with around 400 spectators, and was covered by the New York Times. Rutgers won 29-27.

There is no rule to specify how to decide on who starts the game, but **‘rock, paper, scissors’** is the most popular method, as opposed to the usual coin toss.

Ultimate has **no referees**. Instead, the game relies on the **sportsmanship** of players and invokes **"Spirit of the Game"** to maintain **fair play**. Many tournaments give awards for the most spirited teams and/or players, often based on ratings provided by opposing teams.
